

# ANZAC Day 2021 "We Will Remember Them"













## VALE – HRH PRINCE PHILIP, THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH CONSORT and NAVAL OFFICER

10 JUNE 1921 - 09 APRIL 2021



Prince Philip of Greece joined the Royal Navy in 1939, graduating the following year from the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, as top of his course. Appointed as a Midshipman in January, he would serve at sea for most of the second World War and continue serving with the Royal Navy unrtil 1953.

In February 1940 he joined the battleship HMS *Ramillies* at Ceylon where she was escorting Australian and New Zealand troop convoys across the Indian Ocean, with a visiit to Australia for repairs.

After service in two cruisers, in Ocrober 1940 he joined the battleship HMS *Valiant* in the Mediterranean. During the March 1941 Battle of Cape Matapan, he skillfully directed his ship's search lights for which he was mentioned in despatches (MID).

June 1942 saw the first of his desroyer postings. HMS *Wallace* escorted British east coast covoys before the invasion of Sicly. Promoted to Lieutenant in July 1942, he was appointed its Executive Officer at age 21. In July 1943 he saved his ship from a night bomber attack by launching a decoy raft with smoke floats.



In 1944 Prince Philip was appointed Executive Officer of the new destroyer HMS *Whelp* (above) which commissioned in April. After service at the Normandy landings, *Whelp* reached Ceylon in September. She would remain with the British Pacific Fleet and was present at the Japanese surrender in Tokyo Bay. Earlier in January 1945, he directed the rescue of two shot down British aircrew. Following the surrender, *Whelp* was stationed at Hongkong with the 27<sup>th</sup> Destroyer Squadron.

The ship returned to the United Kingdom in Januaruy 1946 to pay off.

In addition to his MID, he was award the Greek War Cross and the French Croix de Guerre.

Prince Philip then became an instructor at a Petty Officers School. Further shore postings included attending Greenwich Naval College before returning to sea in October 1949 as Executive Officer of the destrotyer HMS *Chequers*.

Promoted to Lieutenant Commader in July 1950, he commanded the wartime sloop HMS *Magpie* in the Mediterranean.

With Royal duty taking precedence, his active naval career ended in January 1953 as a Commander.

### WOMENS ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVAL SERVICE 80<sup>th</sup> BIRTHDAY

Back in April 1941, 12 female telegraphists and two attendants were authorised into service in the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service (WRANS).

Sworn into the Navy as enlisted personnel, that first wave of women arrived at Navy's wireless/transmitting station, which was later commissioned as HMAS *Harman*.

The 80th anniversary of that historic moment was commemorated on 28 April this year at the Australian War Memorial's Last Post ceremony, by Warrant Officer of the Navy Deb Butterworth and former serving WRANS.





#### PRINCESS ANNE LEADS ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATIONS 2021 IN LONDON



The **Australian War Memorial**, in London, was dedicated in 2003 to the 102,000 Australians who died in the First and Second World Wars. The memorial comprises a sem-icircular curved wall of grey-green granite slabs from Western Australia (Verde Laguna granite from Jerramungup), cut in Australia before being shipped to London.

The memorial is located on the southern-most corner of Hyde Park Corner, on the traffic island ,which also houses the Wellington Arch, the New Zealand War Memorial, the Machine Gun Corps Memorial and the Royal Artillery Memorial





On 25<sup>th</sup> April 2021, The Princess Royal attended two ceremonies in London to mark ANZAC Day, with her husband, Vice Admiral Sir Tim Laurence, on behalf of the Royal Family.

In the early hours of Sunday morning, Princess Anne and Sir Tim Laurence arrived for the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at Wellington Arch, where she laid a wreath at the memorial and signed the Book of Remembrance.

Later on the 25<sup>th</sup>, Princess Anne and Sir Tim Laurence attended Westminster Abbey for the annual ANZAC DAY Service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving – paying tribute to all those who gave their lives in the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. And afterwards, met with High Commissioners of Australia and New Zealand and Defence personnel – Masks were mandatory for covid-19 regulations.

As well as being commemorated in Australia and New Zealand, ANZAC Day is also marked in the UK, notably in London and Edinburgh to honour the service and sacrifice of ANZAC soldiers through the years. The day also serves to remember the British soldiers and sailors who fell during the Gallipoli campaign.

Prior to the Australian War Memorial being built, ANZAC Day wreath-laying ceremony has always been held at The Cenotaph, Whitehall, London

### FRENCH RENDEZVOUS FOR ANZAC AND SIRIUS

Naval Task Groups from Australia and France have conducted a bilateral transit in the South China Sea, carrying out a series of training exercises along the way.

The Australian Task Group, comprising the frigate HMAS *Anzac* and auxiliary oiler HMAS *Sirius*, was joined by the French Navy's Jeanne d'Arc Task Group, comprising amphibious assault ship FS *Tonnerre* and the La Fayette-class frigate FS *Surcouf*.

Both Task Groups are deployed to the region and recently trained together during the French-led Exercise La Perouse in the Bay of Bengal in early April.

Commander of the Australian Task Group and Commanding Officer *Anzac* Commander Brendan Horn said he was proud of what had been achieved by the four ships from France and Australia.

"We gained a lot of experience in working with the Jeanne d'Arc Task Group during Exercise La Perouse, so it was a fantastic opportunity for both navies to put that experience to the test in a range of activities including officer-of-the-watch manoeuvres, replenishments at sea and flying operations," Commander Horn said.

"France and Australia enjoy a close partnership and share a commitment to maintaining an open, inclusive and resilient Indo-Pacific."

Meanwhile, *Sirius*' ship's company performed replenishments at sea with all three of the accompanying ships, capping off a busy schedule of at-sea supply exercises during the deployment.

Commanding Officer *Sirius* Commander Chris Doherty said a dual replenishment at sea undertaken with the two French vessels was one of the deployment's many highlights. "Working with partner navies allows us to test our procedures and we've already resupplied vessels from Malaysia, the US, India and Japan in addition to HMAS *Anzac*," Commander Doherty said. "For many of our crew, working with partner navies will be a career milestone that they can look back on with pride."

The Jeanne d'Arc Task Group's five-month deployment will take the French Navy vessels to the Mediterranean, Red and South China Seas and Indian and Pacific oceans.

### VALE LCDR George William (Bill) Harlow NRC (Rtd)



Bill crossed the bar on 20 March 2021 having reached 100 years in February. He served with the Royal Navy and Royal Fleet Reserve for 19 years from 1938. Of his many ships, the cruiser HMS *Penelope* remained his favourite. Later he was a coastal forces instructor.

Bill joined the Sea Cadets in Nottingham in 1961 then, after immigrating to South Australia in 1967, joined TS Adelaide as an instructor. His talents saw him rise to Commanding Officer, followed by posting as Deputy Staff Officer Training SA until retirement in 1983. He remained in contact with the ANC and many of his former cadets. In 2010 he travelled to the Lofoten Islands, Norway, for the unveiling of a new Naval Memorial. He had last been there in 1940 on HMS *Penelope* following the Battle of Narvik.

Bill typified the saying "Once Navy always Navy".
